Nathaniel Bagley Elected as Chairman of the Historical Preservation Authority

At a special public meeting of the Board of Directors on March 2nd 2015, Brother Nathaniel Bagley was elected Chairman of the Board of the Historical Preservation Authority of the City of Birmingham.

The Authority is undertaking a project to be known as the "Freedom Center". The Freedom Center will be used for a variety of activities and events. It will initially house the public policy institute which will provide and promote research, educational and outreach activities which focus on the extension of human and civil rights around the world, (ii) the addition of much-needed archives space for the Civil Rights Institute and (iii) a renovation of the Gaston Motel. The project is estimated to cost 10 million dollars.




Bro. Freeman Holifield, Jr. Assumes Command

Omega Fraternity, Longtime educator, activist Henry Spears

Henry Spears spent his life promoting education and improving race relations in Montgomery, but in 2008 he put it all aside to focus more on family. "I want to concentrate more of my life (on) being with my lovely wife Kathleen and our family," Spears told the Advertiser in a March 2008 news article.

That year, Spears had decided not to seek a fifth term on the Montgomery County Board of Education for health reasons. He had served on the school board for 32 years, the longest of any board member.

Spears died from lower intestinal problems, he was married to Kathleen Spears, of 62 years. He was 81.

"He was a sincere community leader and a dedicated education supporter," Kathleen said. "He was always a very devoted family man and a sincere Christian."

Those who worked with Spears during his lifetime remembered him Tuesday as a devoted educator and community leader as well.

"Mr. Spears' life reflected his belief that a strong public education system is key to creating opportunities for students and building our communities," said Beverly Ross, school board president, in a prepared statement. "He was a steadfast champion of children and a powerful voice on education and equality. He has left a lasting legacy in Montgomery, and he will truly be missed."

Spears was born June 4, 1928, in Montgomery. He attended Alabama State Laboratory High School, graduating in 1946. In 1947, he married Kathleen. The couple had three children.

He went on to earn both his bachelor's and master's degrees in education from Alabama State University, where he would later serve as director of the ASU Foundation for Alumni Affairs. From 1950-1955, he worked as a math and science teacher and as an assistant principal at George Washington Carver High School.

In 1955, Spears joined the Branch YMCA as its executive director, a position that called for him to work with the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. on several occasions, said W.R. Jones, who now serves as executive director of the Cleveland Avenue YMCA, formerly the Branch YMCA.

Spears, who left the YMCA in 1963, was instrumental in getting King as the guest speaker for the Branch YMCA's sixth annual Father and Son banquet in 1955, Jones said. He also worked with King, then with the Montgomery Improvement Association, to use leftover funds from the Rosa ParkS Defense Fund to open the Cleveland Avenue YMCA in 1960, he added.

"He helped to integrate the YMCA by serving on several biracial panels," said Jones, who credited Spears for his decision to serve the YMCA. "He was an outstanding citizen and YMCA laymen."

By 1976, Spears had a different calling in education. That year he was elected to the Montgomery County school board to fill the unexpired term of a board member who had resigned. Getting re-elected to the District 6 school board seat was no easy feat because blacks had to run countywide so soon after the 1960s protest movement had ended, Spears told the Advertiser in 2008.

Carver High School Principal Gary Hall said Spears often visited schools when he served on the school board. He took the time to speak to teachers and students, Hall recalled.

"He spent more than half of his life working for the children of MPS," said Hall, who became acquainted with Spears as members of the Omega Psi Phi Fraternity Inc. "He would give me words of encouragement. He was just that kind of person.

In 2008, Spears said he was proud of his service in education when he looked back over the 32 years he worked to help give blacks an equal opportunity in education.

"If I have to name one single thing that brings a smile to my face, it would have to be my involvement in fighting for and having constructed the first decent school facilities for black students in Montgomery County," Spears said.


